# President's Message

What a wonderful and busy time of year. Spring is when plants are responding to the long days which means we should be busy doing necessary dividing and repotting. Based on the known rooting behavior of the particular orchids, setback will be minimal. The new roots will grow into the fresh medium. Repotting provides the grower an opportunity to inspect for pest and clean off damaged or diseased portions. Say goodbye to remaining winter flowers. Most orchids would benefit from the removal of persistent blooms to allow for needed repotting and energy for new growth. This is a time to watch for the necessity to increase water and fertilizer.

Keikis could be harvested and planted only after the roots are well developed. Don't be in a hurry to pot. The roots should be no less than 1 to 3 inches. Keikis can be a sign of poor culture or unfavorable conditions and if your orchid makes them frequently it may be time to investigate the cause. As for all orchids being repotted match the roots to the pot.

The key to successful orchid growing is to know your orchids, consistent attention to your plants and the conditions they receive. Temperature, light, humidity, fertilizer, required rest, and when does root growth start are some of the conditions to consider and watch for.

# Report on BC Council of Garden Clubs Annual Meeting Held on Zoom 9 AM-noon Saturday, March 27, 2021

I represented VOS as the delegate to this meeting. BC Council of Garden Clubs represents 175 garden and plant-hobbyist clubs across BC. Its main objective is to build a financial base from members to award scholarships to colleges and universities. These are then given to outstanding students to enable them to carry out research projects. For information on any of the speakers below please contact BCCGC

- 1. Executive and committee reports were given
- 2. Scholarships: In 2020, \$6,869 was donated by member clubs and \$11,700 was awarded to 12 colleges and universities to be given to outstanding post-graduate student research projects.

2 scholarship winners gave PowerPoint presentations on their current project.

- Patricia Hamuszak, MA student at UBC presented on "Grassland Set-asides in Delta". She worked with farmers in Delta to provide generous grasslands throughout their agricultural land in order to preserve soil fertility and wildlife habitat.
- Nathan Ross, a Masters student in Landscape Architecture at UBC used his scholarship \$ to study recent projects in Europe and U.S. on landscape restoration focusing on using natural water landscapes to improve landscape design. These include managing and enhancing storm surge, tides, and sea level landscape situations.

Both presentations were very interesting and professionally presented with good illustrations, photos and personal explanations.

- 3. Guest speaker was Winnie Hwo from the David Suzuki Foundation on the Butterflyway project. This is a nation-wide on-the-ground meeting of volunteers to encourage, educate and plant butterfly-friendly flowers in all kinds of landscapes from lanes to homes to playing fields and industrial sites. Very inspiring to see the photos of the thousands of volunteers concentrating on improving our environment in a cooperative and creative way.
- 4. Final task is for delegates to vote on wording changes to the constitution. This done by Survey Monkey and has been completed.

A very well-managed and interesting meeting. So heartening to see all the volunteers and young students working together for a common goal of improving and preserving our precious lands.



#### Monthly Checklist for March and April – adapted from the AOS Website

#### Cattleya

Many standard cattleyas and their hybrids will now be in bloom or are close to blooming. Be vigilant for senescing sheaths. These yellowing sheaths should be carefully removed otherwise entrapped moisture may lead to bud rot. Opening and removing the sheath will usually allow the buds to develop – stake to provide support. With weather and sun levels frequently changing in spring be attentive to shading and increased ventilation to avoid leave burn and excessive heat buildup. Increased day length results in new growth and increased need for water and fertilizer.

Right after blooming is optimal time to repot winter/spring flowering cattleyas. Doing so now usually results in little/no growth setback.

#### **Cymbidiums**

Many of these will putting on a great show now. Watch for aphids/slugs/snails and they find the flowers delicious! Stake spikes to get the best display. Increase water to support the increased demand when these orchids are in bloom. Increase nitrogen as new growths appear and provide as much light as possible with our burning the leaves – insufficient light is commonly the cause of a failure to bloom.

#### **Dendrobium (Australian)**

These should be at their peak flowing now. To ensure optimal growth and flowering of this group provide ample light, water, and fertilizer during the growing season.

#### Lycaste

These orchids will be nearing the end of their blooming season. You should see new growths appearing. This is the best time to repot into new media. As the new growths emerge and grow provide more water and fertilizer. Your goal is to get increasingly large pseudobulbs each year.

#### Miltoniopsis

Spring marks the start of the flowering season for this genus. The variety of colors, number of blooms and some cases fragrance will provide weeks of pleasure. Stake spikes as needed and remove yellowing leaves for best display.

#### **Paphiopedilum**

This is a great time to inspect your paphs. Do they have dead leaves need to be removed? Do they need repotting – these orchids generally respond well to an annual repotting in fresh media. Be on the lookout for mealybugs as they love to hide in the axils and crowns of these lovely orchids.

Many will be coming into spike. Be careful with staking these – if done too soon the flowering can develop a 'nodding' stance such that the dorsal petal does not stand upright.

#### **Phalaenopsis**

The early spring months are often the peak flowering time for phalaenopsis. Stake and train the spikes to achieve an optimal arching display.

Phal. spikes grow rapidly so be sure to supply more water and fertilizing to meet this demand. The increase in day length also contributes to these increased needs. Watch for mealybug or scale attacks and treat early to avoid damaged buds.

#### **Pleurothallids**

This is a large genus and many of these orchids will be in bud/flower now. If they are not in bloom this is a good time to divide and repot into fresh media. Doing so now will allow them to become well established before hotter summer temperatures arrive.
